
Heritage Network has Successful Launch

LENNOXVILLE - The first conference of the Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network, held at Bishop's University on June 23-25 was received enthusiastically by over 110 registrants from across Quebec. Representing more than 40 heritage groups these delegates reacted with keen appreciation of the first chance to meet new people who share their interests and concerns and began serious and light-hearted discussions of the challenges and opportunities they share. The idea of the network found a keenly receptive audience as people took full advantage of this chance to begin serious networking.

Addressing the theme "Building Future for our Past", keynote speaker and Townshippers' Association president Gary Richards welcomed the new heritage network to the grouping of anglophone community groups operating throughout Quebec and expressed the belief that the QAHN would bring a needed dimension to province wide activities in support of our common goals. He stressed that so much that has been accomplished has been the product of active volunteerism and the involvement by volunteers must continue to be at the base and at the forefront of our efforts.

A founding convention closed the conference on Sunday with a structure and constitution proposed and officers chosen. The elected president is Richard Evans of Lennoxville, the vice president is Rod MacLeod, the secretary is Betty LeMaistre, and treasurer is David Freemen, all from Montreal. The other directors are Pat Mc-Caffrey of Hudson, Georges Howson of Beauharnois, Monique P. Nadeau of Sigawake, Sharon Little of Quebec, and Ralph Farley of Richmond. In accepting the office of president, Evans commented on how rewarding it was for conference planners to observe the excitement of participants and also took special note that of the nine board members, two are francophones. An invitation was tendered for a similar conference next June in The Gaspe, an idea that met with keen interest.

TRANS CANADA TRAIL - RELAY 2000

Relay 2000, the event marking the opening of the Cross Canada Trail will wind its way through the Gatineau Valley September 2nd and 3rd. The Low to Wakefield portion will occur on September 2nd, and continue on to Chelsea on September 3rd. Festivities are scheduled for after 2:00 p.m. at the Wakefield Recreation Centre (Speeches, music and refreshments). All are welcome to attend!

The Trans Canada Trail will be a shared-use recreation Trail that will wind its way through every province and territory. It will be the longest trail of its kind in the world, spanning approximately 16,000 kilometres. The Trail will accommodate five core activities: walking, cycling, horseback riding, cross-country skiing and snowmobiling (where possible/desired).
