
Internet Workshop
Finding Your Family Tree: Genealogical Research on the Web

The workshop will focus on the interactive search techniques available to users to locate genealogy records posted on the internet. In addition to using standard web search engines, like GOOGLE, the instructor will assist participants access the many genealogic specific web sites, such as GEN-WEB, to demonstrate the wealth of international collaboration that makes Geneaology one of the hottest internet topics. Attendees should bring with them any relevant genealogy materials regarding their ancestors, including location, year, immigration histories, so that this specific data can be used to key into the search engines to find what is available on the web.

### Heritage Trails

With the help and guidance from many volunteers, Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network began and completed the pilot phase of its Heritage Trails project during first three the months of 2002. A grant from the Department of Canadian Heritage allowed OAHN to pay for the services of a full-time project coordinator over this period and to print several thousand guides in time for the 2002 summer tourist season. The following guides with road maps, are now available:

- ⇒ Megantic County Heritage Trail, for the Eastern Townships;
- ⇒ Châteauguay Valley Heritage Trail, for Southwest Ouebec;
- ⇒ The Outaouais-Pontiac Heritage Trail, for the Ouatouais
- ⇒ In addition, a special thematic walking-tour guide was prepared for the Quebec City area, entitled: Old Quebec: English Echoes in a Proud Harbour.

The aim of the Heritage Trails project is to stimulate interest in a greater appreciation for the history of Quebec's English-speaking communities. Given the sheer number of potential heritage sites and points of interest, the creators of the pamphlets determined that certain regions warrant development of more than a single Heritage Trails tour. Such is the case of the Outaouais. Whereas the first guide concentrates on the Pontiac district of the Ottawa River valley west of Hull, separate tours could and should be organized in the Gatineau Valley and the Lièvre and Petite Nation districts.

These guides merely interpret a few highlights of Quebec's anglophone history that can still be glimpsed from the road. Time erodes the memory of early settlements. The decline of English-speaking communities and municipal amalgamations have led to the disappearance of traditional place names. In parts of the Quebec country side, lonely churches and fading grave markers constitute the only visible traces of this past. Hopefully the Heritage Trails will invite sightseers to rediscover this past.

I am related to the Hudson's mentioned in the article, the one who married a Fairbairn. My great-great-grandmother was Susanah Hudson.


