NEW NAME FOR OUR HISTORICAL SOCIETY

CHELSEA: With about 50 members in attendance at the 41st Annual General Meeting of the Historical Society of The Gatineau, there was a unanimous agreement to amend the Society's Constitution to change the name of the long established organization to the **Gatineau Valley Historical Society** / **Societé historique de la Vallée de la Gatineau**. Jay Atherton, the Society's Archivist, who is also the keeper of the Constitution, told the audience that the original name has often led some people to think that the Society is based in the former city of Gatineau and that it was shortened to Gatineau Historical Society "the creation of the City of Gatineau has considerably exacerbated the original problem." he explained. The Society's mandate has traditionally focused on the Ouatouais region north of the City of Gatineau, into the rural communities connected by the Gatineau River Valley. Ernie Mahoney, President of the Society said that he was pleased to have served as the last President of the Historical Society of The Gatineau and pleased to become the first President of the Gatineau Valley Historical Society.

Our Mission

The Gatineau Valley Historical Society / Societé historique de la Vallée de la Gatineau, is a charitable not-for-profit organization which has acted to conserve and foster interest in history and heritage of the Gatineau Valley region for over forty years, since its founding in 1962.

As a voluntary organization, the Historical Society achieves through the work of people - executive, committees, members and by influencing people. Our activities range from organizing events to publishing, preserving archival material of local historical interest. We interact with other history and heritage groups in the region, and work as an active, locallybased group to make our resources and assistance available within the wider community.

We eagerly anticipate this year's collection read. which will be available at the annual dinner. Of course you realize that your free copy is one of the benefits of membership in the society.



Wakefield Cenotaph Restoration Project

The new Wakefield cenotaph was dedicated, Sunday, November 10, to the memory of the ten young men from the Wakefield area who gave their lives for Canada in the World Wars of 1914-1918 and 1939-1945.

The new cenotaph replaces one erected by volunteers from the Wakefield Legion 25 years ago. Rather than make extensive and expensive renovations to the old memorial, a modern-style cenotaph design was approved. Lorne Shouldice, a Legion veteran and one of the original volunteers who erected the 1977 monument, led the funding drive which raised over \$30,000, of which \$1,000 was donated by the GVHS.

A sub-committee of the Historical Society of The Gatineau, chaired by Mr. Shouldice, worked With a group of volunteers, including Norma Walmsley, Shirley Shouldice, Neil Faulkner, Jenny Temple, and Anita Rutledge.


Union Mission Church Committee

The Historical Society's Union Mission Church Committee is working to create a unique monument, commemorating the history of Chelsea's churches. This is an update on their work toward salvaging a section of the historic Kirk's Ferry Union Mission Church, which they intend to refurbish and re-erect as a chapel or historical monument.

The Committee has undertaken to investigate ways in which to commemorate the presence of this church in the community, and in particular to explore whether part of the church could be salvaged as a monument, conserving it as part of Chelsea's built heritage. Restoration Architect Alan Hopkins volunteered his services to design several versions of a structure that would preserve and use a portion of the existing building. These include using a segment of the church as a rebuilt chapel, or creating a monument using the facade of the church, and providing appropriate signage and plaques to recount the story of this church and Chelsea's other churches.

The Committee plans to involve and work with Chelsea community representatives to explore options for a commemorative chapel or monument. Anyone interested in working with this committee is urged to contact Carol Martin at (819) 827-1633 (e-mail 6993595@ican.net) or Harold Reid, (819) 827-0138. Work plans and projected costs for the reconstituted monument depend on the option and site chosen but are in the range of \$10,000 to \$25,000, part of which will be offset by selling the land and some of the furnishings, including some of the old pews. Donations to the fund to complete the salvage operations and recreate a segment of the church as a community monument can be sent to the Historical Society of the Gatineau, marked "Union Mission Church Fund;" charitable donations receipts will be provided.

PUBLICATIONS REPORT FOR 2002



In May 2002, volume 28 of the Society's annual publication, Up the Gatineau!, was published and distributed. Members can look forward to receiving volume 29 at the Annual Dinner (to be held this year on June 9). The continuing appearance of new topics, along with the mix of new authors and seasoned "regulars" writing about them, is one of the exciting aspect of editing each year's volume of Up the Gatineau! Anyone interested in writing for future editions is heartily encouraged to contact Carol Martin for further information and support.

This year, it was decided to announce and award the Arthur Davison Prize at the Annual Dinner, at the same time as members receive the newest volume of Up the Gatineau! - so stay tuned to learn who receives this prize!

Duncan and Gudula Marshall, who have distributed the Gatineau Valley Historical Society's publications for a number of years, received an Award of Honour from the Society in February of this year. The Society is truly grateful to Duncan and Gudula for their interest and support. We also welcome the husband-and wife team of Harold and Margaret Reid, of Kirk's Ferry, who will be taking over publication distribution in April 2003.

During the summer of 2003, Carol Martin arranged for reprints of 100 copies each of 13 back issues (volumes 1-11, 18 and 22) of Up the Gatineau!, as we have noted that there is continued interest in earlier volumes. We also sell a "special collected set," of the first 25 volumes with an Index for \$75 (a saving of \$12 over the price if purchased separately). As well as providing Up the Gatineau! to members, the Society sells it at 14 outlets (in Chelsea, Wakefield, Kazabazua and Poltimore), and markets the current issue and back issues of all volumes, along with the Society's Historic Map of Chelsea-1875 and several other publications. These are available at each meeting of the Society, directly from the distributors (contact the Reids at 827-0138 or by e-mail (reidh@travel.net.com), and at special events such as the HSG Annual Dinner, its Annual Auction and the Gene-O-Rama conference (held in March at Centrepointe in Ottawa).

Total publication sales for the year 2002 were \$3293.29, including both actual sales as well as stock placed on consignment in the retail outlets listed below. Seven "collected sets" were sold.


We also have been monitoring the Protestant Burial

GVHS ARCHIVES - REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2002

Location, Hours

The Archives of the Historical Society exists to preserve and make available records relating to the history of the Gatineau Valley, and of the Society itself. Located in the basement room of the Chelsea Municipal Library, 100 Old Chelsea Road, the Archives is open for consultation on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoons, from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., September through mid-June. Researchers may also consult the holdings by appointment during the summer months.

Genealogy and Research

In addition to responding to 57 visits during the past year, the Archives handled 49 written inquiries (a 44% increase over the 34 processed in 2001). The majority of these requests arrived by electronic mail, largely as a result of people accessing the Gatineau History web site. 25 of the 49 inquiries were genealogical in nature, requests from people throughout North America researching their family roots in the Gatineau Valley. They included the following family names: Brown, Bullis, Cameron, Charlebois, Collins, Daugherty, Fairbairn, Hastey, MacLaren, Murray, Newcomb, O'Neil, Osborne, Patterson, Roberts, Rooney, Scanlon, Spragge, Taggart, and Wright. The inquiries came from places as diverse as Seattle, New York City, Montreal, Aldergrove, BC, Woodstock, Victoria, and Calgary--as well as "ether-land" (e-mail messages with no indication of postal address) and, of course both sides of the Ottawa River in the National Capital Region.

Library

Our library consists of several hundred volumes, stored rather precariously on rudimentary shelving in a small room within the basement area of the Chelsea Library. It is crowded and somewhat difficult to use. As the year drew to a close, the librarian, Joan Gherson, was working with Peggy Atherton, planning how we should gain greater control over the collection by cataloguing it properly. Using the Dewey Decimal classification system and a useful generic software package called *Library Master*, Peggy began the cataloguing process during December. She hopes to complete the task by the end of 2003.

Steps are being taken to enlarge the available shelf space, to handle the reorganized volumes during the cataloguing process, and allow for greater ease of access in the future. In addition, a filing cabinet has been installed in the room to hold the "vertical files" of reference material on topics of interest to our users.

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES OF THE IMAGE BANK PROJECT

ast year was a productive one for this project

Conversion of Paper Photos Completed -- During the year, the image bank was brought up-to-date. Now all images held in the paper files have been converted to the Image Bank. These old images remain in their folders.

Paper Images Rarely Used -- Our collection of paper photos now is rarely used. Customers are happy to view the computerized images and to make prints of them on the computer's printer. This saves the originals from handling. Customers Served -- In 2002 we were busy every Wednesday afternoon while we were on duty. We made about 20 images for Le Restaurant de la Vallée and about the same quantity for Les Trois Erables. We scanned and printed photos and saved them on CD for Up the Gatineau!. We supplied photos for the Remembrance Day display in the Library. Artist Ed Robinson was a regular visitor, scouring the image bank for ideas for historical paintings. Writer Katharine Fletcher visited to collect images for her new book, Capital Walks, soon to be published. Photos were selected from the Image Bank for the planned web site for the Historical Society. A large map of Larrimac was scanned in sections and pasted together in Photoshop for Michael Cooper and put on CD for his use.

New Photos Added – By the end of 2002, the image bank contained some 3500 photos. We received hundreds of new photos during the year. Anita Rutledge, Norma Geggie, Janeth McKinley and Carol Martin were particularly active in bring in new photos. Heather Quipp let us copy her CD col-


lection of images of Mountain Lodge. Allan Richens brought in ski photos and let us copy a CD of Yacht Club photos. He also supplied us with images of the Larrimac Golf Club. Bob Hughes brought in photos of Cascades. Images arrived from Ernie Mahoney of the Wakefield area. Adrienne Herron added photos of the Chelsea Protestant Burial Grounds and the Pioneer Cemetery. About 50 images of smaller cemeteries in the Wakefield area were donated by Norma Geggie. We added photos of the Vincent Hendrick Farm and some images of flowers presented years ago to the Historical Society by Anne Ginns on garden plants used by the early settlers. Marilyn Liddiard brought in a collection of photos documenting the Lynott family. Many others were received as well. Equipment -- We had our computer repaired two or three times during the year and now it is working well. We appear to have learned to live with the printer problem that has plagued us since the beginning. We may want to consider acquiring a better printer someday now that inks and papers are being manufactured that guarantee an image for up to 80 years. The life expectancy of an image with the current setup is likely less than 4 years.

Computer Resources – We are now using almost half the resources of our computer, close to 20 gigabytes.

Volunteers – Annette Brand does most of the recording, scanning and saving of images. David and Eileen Castelman create the records and insert the photos. Norma Geggie edits the text. Adrienne Herron backs up the system and saves the photos on CD for both on site and off site backup.

TRUCK FALLS THROUGH BRIDGE!



We were very excited to receive this incredible photograph from Jane (Earle) Mcdonald for the Image Bank. This image is one of about 300 contained in two albums she inherited from her father, Lorne Earle or her uncle, Bun (Clair) Earle. The photos range in date from the twenties to the mid forties.

Jane loaned the albums to Norma Geggie and the volunteers at the Image Bank have been busily scanning the photos and creating records with information about each one. They're just about finished. Soon the albums will be returned to their rightful owner.

Many of the photos are fading, but we've been able to improve them considerably using Photoshop, a computer program that allows us to control contrast and brightness, remove stains, mildew and dust spots and make other improvements. Now they're preserved for posterity and for future viewing and reference by everyone. And someday,

they'll be available on Internet for the whole world to access. Then you will be able to research the Image Bank or just view the photos for pleasure from your home.

Norma Geggie has been adding all the information she knows about each photograph. However, she's stuck on this one and we need our members help. At first we didn't even know the year, but when we peaked at the back of the photograph, it was luckily entered in pencil. In 1925, what appears to be a truck, fell through the bottom of the Wakefield covered bridge. Shredded wooden planks hang through the gaping hole left by the truck before it plunged to the rocks and water below.
