# Up to Low!


Everybody's talking about something frightening and exciting. Somebody's going to build a dam. Right here. And the falls will disappear .... And I'm very worried about it.

(from Mary Ann Alice, by Brian Doyle)

The Paugan Dam, constructed between 1926 and 1932, changed many aspects of the community of Low and surroundings. "That dam put Low on the map. Many a farm would have a new team, new buildings, even, after the dam was built," Nellie McLaughlin (née Foley) remarked. She remembered the church picnics held south of the Paugan waterfall before the dam was built and when Kate Hickey told her of the plan to build a dam, "I thought it was the

greatest fish story l ever heard. (Kate) showed me the place. We saw a lot of people taking a look at it. There was really just a trickle of water; you wouldn't believe it could have all that power."

The Gatineau Power Company was incorporated on March 11 1926 by the International Paper Company, then the world's largest paper producer, which had established Canadian International Paper (CIP) in 1919. The company's mandate was to exploit



the hydroelectric potential of Quebec's rivers and streams. In 1921, they acquired the Riordon Pulp and Paper Company, a Montreal concern that had recently bought the Gilmour and Hughson holdings in the Gatineau. It also owned valuable water rights on the Gatineau River. The company planned to construct hydroelectric plants on three sites on the lower Gatineau: a 35 meter drop at Paugan Falls, a 30 meter drop at Chelsea Falls and an 18 meter drop at Farmer's Rapids.

In 1970, Wayne moved on to Kingston, Ontario, where he became a television news anchor. At the same time, he began entertaining in local coffee houses, performing some of his original composi-

tions. Even then, Wayne's songs reflected a passion for people, their lives and activities. Two years later, he left radio and television and moved to a cabin in Quebec's Gatineau Hills to pursue his entertaining and songwriting interests full-time.

Wayne returned to broadcasting in 1975 as Music Director for CKBY-FM in Ottawa, moving on a year later to CJCN Radio, in Grand Falls, Newfoundland as Program Director, all the while continuing to entertain on weekends. In 1978, Wayne returned to his Ottawa Valley roots and in

1979, released his first musical album, Writer of Songs, which earned him two Juno Nominations and won an RPM Big Country Award as Most Promising Male Country Singer in Canada.

That same year, he accepted an invitation to host CBC Ottawa's Country Report. The rural lifestyles show quickly became a local hit, winning several Ottawa ACTRA Awards In 1987, Country Report evolved into a national series, On The Road Again with Wayne Rostad. In its 15-year broadcast history, On The Road Again has won four Gemini awards for Best Lifestyle Series in Canadian Television. Wayne himself has been honoured with no less than seven Gemini. Wayne maintains, however, that his greatest reward is the devotion of his On The Road Again viewers. Each week, for fifteen years, fans have faithfully tuned in to watch his show!

Musically, Wayne has, to date, released three solo albums of original compositions: Writer of Songs,

Again and most recently, Storyteller, a CD celebrating the people and places encountered on his Or The Road Again travels.

Wayne has engaged in charitable works through-


out his career. In February 1998, he spear-headed and co-hosted Power Aid Live, which generated more than \$6 million for the Ice Storm Relief Fund. He regularly co-hosts the Children's Miracle Network Telethon in Ottawa, helping raise over \$3 million annually for the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario. He is also the host of the University of Ottawa Heart Institute Telethon, which raises in excess of \$3 million annually as well. In addition, he has co-hosted Easter Seals Telethons, both in Winnipeg and Toronto and

has helped host fundraising telethons in Halifax, Charlottetown and St. John's Newfoundland, just to name a few.

Back home, Wayne Rostad's Gatineau Clog was, for fifteen years, one of Canada's most successful annual outdoor music festivals and raised close to a half-million dollars for community hospitals and service organizations.

In October 1996, singer, songwriter, entertainer, broadcaster and public speaker, Wayne Rostad, became an author. McClelland and Stewart launcher Wayne Rostad, *On The Road Again* in hardcover. The book details his travels in Canada, the people he has met along the way and amusing behind the scenes anecdotes about the making of the television series, *On The Road Again*. The book became a best-seller.

Home for Wayne, his wife Leanne and son Josh, is a farm near Ottawa



#### Up the Gatineau!

In June, at our Annual Dinner (held at the Wakefield Mill), we recognized the seven authors who had contributed to Volume 29 of *Up the Gatineaul*, and were especially pleased that "cover girl" **Alice Lee Hudson** was present. The Lee family's photograph of their 1915 Model T Ford included Alice and two of her brothers; the family's trip to Edmonton and back was the subject of an article written by her father. Members present at the dinner received copies of the publication, while those unable to attend received theirs by mail.

**Carol Martin** was awarded the **Arthur Davison Prize** for her article on "Private Richard Rowland Thompson's 'Chelsea Connection': Bertha Alexander and the Alexanders of Chelsea," published in Volume 28. Stay tuned (until our dinner, in May this year) to learn who will receive this prize for Volume 29!



# The Gladys Cross Payne Collection: Suitcase of Treasures

The extensive collection was donated by Linda Payne Bardell, daughter of Mrs. Gladys Payne, a fourth generation descendant of pioneer Isaac Cross who settled the Meech Creek Valley in the early 1800s.

Highlights of the collection include photographs of the construction of the landmark covered bridge on Pine Road, views of the lost village of Cascades, and a genealogical treasure-trove of portraits of early pioneer families. Gladys Payne's legacy is particularly poignant in its depiction of the daily life of the farming families of the Meech Creek Valley. The land was appropriated by the NCC in 1973 for a zoo and has since remained vacant.

The photos are being scanned for the GVHS Image Bank, a publicly-available collection of Gatineau-area historic photographs, housed in the Society's Archives in the basement of the Chelsea Library.


Selections from the collection will be displayed at the April 19 GVHS meeting at the Chelsea Community Centre.

# La Vallee Meech / Meech Valley 1972-2002 March 21—May 28 at the Chelsea Library

Society member, Peggy Atherton opened her exhibition of Meech Valley landscapes on March 20 at the Cheslea Library.

The charming watercolours depict many of the farms that once existed in the Meech Creek Valley before the NCC began expropriating the lands in 1970's to make way for a proposed zoo, that never came to pass. In the thirty years since the land was acquired, many houses and barns have been demolished and the farm land abandoned. The Meech Creek Valley was once seen as a typical Gatineau River farming community, so Peggy's work serves to document the historical landscape of the valley.

The exhibition of 20 watercolours is accompanied by a map which shows that location of the homes and buildings depicted in each painting.
