The William Fairbairn House

Wakefield 's treasured house to be made into a GVH5 Museum.


At the May 2 La Pêche Council meeting, councilors voted for the municipality to purchase the **William Fairbairn House** from Wakefield Harbour Development and relocate it across the river to Hendrick Park, adjacent to the Wakefield Covered Bridge. The municipality agreed to spend up to fifty thousand dollars to move the building and bring it up to municipal code.

Once in place, the GVHS will lead a project, in partnership with the municipality, to turn the building into a quality bilingual museum focusing on the local history of La Pêche and the Gatineau Valley.

Wakefield treasure saved again!

The William Fairbairn House has great historical significance. It is one of the oldest houses in Wakefield and is certainly the first house in the village to be constructed of sawn lumber. More importantly, it is the house of Scottish settler William Fairbairn, who built the first grist mill on the La Pêche River in 1838, establishing Wakefield Village as an important commercial centre within the region.

This homestead was built in the late 1860s to replace the first house which was constructed of logs and situated closer to the river. The house and farmland was passed to the Stevenson family and later the McNally family who farmed the property until 1989.

The Fairbairn House was relocated to its current location in 1993 from its former site just below the present fire hall, by the late Andy Tommy who owned the property at that time. He did this at his own expense, since no one was willing to save the old farm house from being bulldozed to make way for the highway A5/105/366 intersection. The house remained unused until Andy sold the property to the late Dave Rinn who renovated the house and it became part of Wakefield Marina, and later Wakefield Harbour.

For many in Wakefield, the house has come to symbolize the threat of rapid development on the village's unique cachet. In his address to La Pêche council, Society member Neil Faulkner noted that "... as it stands now, Wakefield Harbour Development is singularly unattractive. The only building that has any grace or style and which still catches the eye is the old Fairbairn home. It really does evoke memories and qualities of past times. How can we stand by and see it destroyed?"

Museum Objective

There are many good reasons to create a museum in La Peche. Currently, there are no other museum facilities from Hull to Maniwaki and the establishment of a museum in La Pêche will enhance the Municipality's potential as a recreo-tourism destination. At the same time the museum will focus attention on maintaining and preserving the heritage elements that contribute to Wakefield's unique and marketable historical landscape.

Museum steering committee

The Society has formed a steering committee, consisting of representatives from our Board of Directors, someone from the Covered Bridge Committee, representatives from the CLD and Municipality of La Pêche, and members from the wider community with relevant abilities and experience.

Historic Site Designation

The first order of business for this committee is to have the building registered on the Quebec *Répertoire des biens culturels et arrondissements*¹, and *Canada's Historic Places Register*² in order to facilitate securing funding from these levels of government. We are confident that we can build the case for including this site on these registries based on the historic importance of its builder, and by the fact

that the house is an important example of the historic architecture of this region.

Feasibilty Study

By the end of May the steering committee expects to submit a proposal to the CLD des Collines-de-l'Outaouais seeking funds to write a feasibility study and business plan.

The study will enable us to determine the costs related to getting the building ready for public use, including the costs of basic services, exterior renovations, and the interior renovation required to create space for permanent and temporary museum exhibits, administrative space, and possibly space for a gift and coffee shop. We will also want to determine the costs associated to acquiring, managing and mounting displays of museum artifacts and archival materials.

The feasibility study will identify potential sources of funding from local, provincial and federal government agencies, as well as from local fundraising activities. The study will identify sources of revenue generation for the museum such as entrance fees, tour fees, the sale of publications and gifts. As well, we want to study the potential of securing other funding to run heritage related programs in the areas of genealogy, new bilingual publications, education programs, historic mapping, etc.

With a Business Plan in hand, we can begin applying for grants from government and to seek contributions from the wider community.

This is good time to move forward on this project. Both the recent federal and provincial budgets made new funds available to create and maintain museums. There is also a new emphasis on promoting heritage resources within regional tourism strategies. There are unprecedented opportunities to harness the resources and local abilities required to create a quality heritage attraction in the Municipality of La Peche.



I was amused to read of Duncan Dufresne's recent account of the caterpillars on the tracks of the Maniwaki train. Maybe I can match, or even better his account.

My mother (born 1902) grew up in Ottawa and went to Elgin Street Public School. She had a fund of stories of her childhood and one she often told was about a classmate, Morris Luke, whose family rented a cottage at Rockland every year from May to September. Morris had to take the train into Ottawa every morning and she remembered being very impressed by his most original excuse — "I'm late because there were caterpillars on the train tracks and the train couldn't get up the hill."

I also grew up in Ottawa. When I was at Queen's University I met an engineering student, Trevor Luke, and when he came home with me to "meet the parents", we quickly discovered he was Morris's nephew — but had never heard the caterpillar story.

Trevor and I have tried to locate the site of the Rockland cottage but with no success. We still own my family's cottage at Wolfe lake. My father built it in 1940 and I have spent part of every summer there since then.

I greatly enjoy both the Newsletter and the annual booklet.
