## Chelsea Events - September 11-12, 2021

In Chelsea, the Municipality and the La Fab Arts Centre, in keeping with the Les Journées du Patrimoine religieux theme, have organized a tour of the area, called a Discovery Walking Tour of Chelsea's Religious Heritage Sites featuring five points of interest. A map and informative questionnaire for each point of interest will be available for pickup on those days at the La Fab Arts Centre on Old Chelsea Road.

Other points of interest, besides the above mentioned churches, include:

- •the former Grace United Church at 8 Mill Road and future home of the La Fab Arts Centre;
- •the Old Chelsea Protestant Burial Ground at 249 Old Chelsea Road in Old Chelsea;
- •the Pioneer Cemetery and Cenataph at 587 Highway 105.

The self-guided tour covers about three kilometres and may also be done by car.

Of particular note, on Sunday, September 12, from 1 to 4 pm, volunteer guides from the GVHS will be at the two heritage-designated cemeteries. David Yuill and John Udvarhelyi will be at the Old Chelsea Protestant Burial Ground and André Renaud and Louise Schwartz will be at the Pioneer Cemetery and Cenataph to talk about the fascinating history of these two sites and those buried within. Volunteers are also planned to be at the other sites noted above.

allowed inside at a time). Questions will be answered in either language on both days. Parking is available on site.

# ~ Remembering Larry Dufour ~

A pillar in the Chelsea community, including St. Stephen's Church and the Larrimac Golf Club,

Larry dedicated his life to helping others. His 84 years were filled with wonderful adventures and incredible accomplishments, but what mattered to him most were his family, friends and community.

He was a featured speaker at two GVHS meetings. In April 2012 he spoke about the history of the Larrimac Golf Club and in October 2015 he gave another history lesson on St. Stephen's Church in Old Chelsea. He also contributed to an article in volume 36 of Up the Gatineau! on the Collins Sawmill with Archie Pennie.

#### Sugar from the Gatineau by Don Ferguson




My late father, Neil Ferguson, was manager of the Lower Ottawa Forestry Protective Association from 1930 to 1948. This association was owned by C.I.P., Eddy, Booth, Maclaren and Singer. Its purpose was to detect fires, using observation towers, and to stop them, covering an area north of Hull and south of the CN rail line.

In the summer, one of the functions of his job was to visit towers and equipment depots (he claimed he wore out a car each year). In mid-1945 he returned home from a visit with a 100 lb. bag of white sugar in his car, purchased at one of the lumber camps.

As sugar was still being rationed, my mother was horrified that our neighbours would see the sugar. She ordered that the bag be covered (it was, by a black rubber raincoat) and that the car trunk be locked. After dark, with all outside lights off, my brother and I were ordered to bring the sugar in, still covered by the rain coat, using our wheelbarrow at our back door, and then to carry it to the kitchen.
