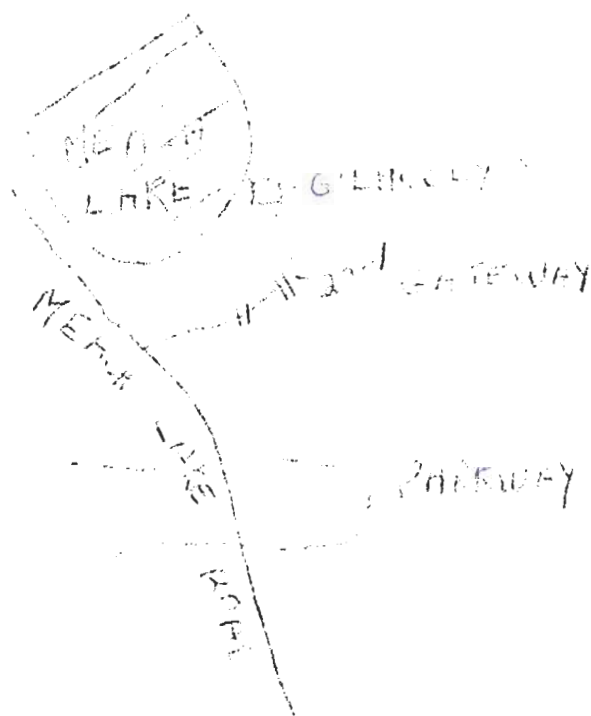
Our next meeting will be SUNDAY, JULY 17th at 3 P.M. ^{'66}
