Despite some cross winds and a few threatening clouds Auction Sale Day had sufficiently fine weather to give us a good sale with a large turn-out of bidders. Our gross 'take' was 4,229.14 which included 114.25 from ticket sales for the two raffle items. This was a little less than last year. 54 members and friends consigned 318 items - down 50 from last year. Of these, 6 people donated to the Society a variety of items which sold for 115.50 for which we thank them.

We had 212 registered bidders and possibly the highlight of the day was being able to shut up shop at 6.45 p.m. - about 2 hours earlier than last year and the earliest in memory. We are still haunted by the recollection of the 1971 Sale, conducted in the rain, when we worked until after midnight to handle some 580 items.

Megan Richards and Jennifer moore provided different and delicious sustenance to our many patrons throughout the day.

Thanks to the planning and effort of a very large number of willing volunteers we can 'chalk up' another successful sale - our sixteenth, with many of the original 'cast'.

A smaller than anticipated 'crowd' turned out on Sunday, 23 July for this event. With the help of friends and two welcome visitors from the Carleton-West Russell Historical Society, we mustered 20 for the walking tour of Aylmer.

Because of her intimate knowledge of her subject, Diane Aldred, who was our most competent guide, was able to make old Aylmer come alive in retrospect. On account of the many heritage properties remaining this was a most satisfying locale for a tour and we absorbed a lot.

To cap the day, Denise Friend, President, and others of the Aylmer Heritage Association did themselves proud and provided us with a delightful tea with delicious home-made sandwiches and cakes.

The whole ISOBEL MARY RYAN whole afternoon can be classed as one of life's more pleasant experiences.
