Last Meeting

The February meeting of the Society was held on Monday, February 15th, 1988 at the Maison des Citoyens in Hull.

The special Heritage Day programme, organized around the theme "Heritage Chaudière", was arranged by our Society with the Chaudière Committee of the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society. The meeting was open to members of the public.

Before and after the meeting, members and guests had an opportunity, to view an exceptional collection of historic photographs depicting the history of the Chaudière. Coffee, juice and refreshments were available and the many publica-

tions of the Society were on display and available for sale.

The moderator for the evening, Pierre-Louis Lapointe of Archives de Québec, welcomed Conseillier Cyr who brought greetings from the City of Hull. Mayor Michel Légère, who was attending a meeting of municipal officials in Edmonton, sent his regrets.

The first half of the evening was dedicated to the theme, "If the Chaudière Could Talk". Graham Greig, Director of Operations for the E. B. Eddy Company, gave a dramatic presentation on the development of industries on the Chaudière. The spirit of Ezra Butler Eddy materialized for the occasion in stove pipe hat and fur collared coat. He outlined the early evolution of the lumber trade, the later development of subsequent industries and the unique role played by the founder throughout these formative years.

The second half of the evening's programme focused on the theme, "The Future of the Chaudière". **Denis Major**, NCC Director of Planning, discussed the importance of the Chaudière in the National Capital Plan. Multiprojector, dual-screen slide presentations, aided by simultaneous interpretation, carried us back to the early years of LeBreton flats.

Bill McGowan, Director of the Museum of Science and Technology, ended the evening with an informal and open discussion of the plans for "The Museum at the Chaudière".

This was an especially interesting and ambitious event for the Society timed to coincide with Heritage Day. Programmes Chairman Tony German deserves a special vote of appreciation for his skilful organization of this occasion

Call us! A telephone and answering machine will be installed by March 15. Our number is 827-4432.


Finances

Dunn Hotel, Old Chelsea, Québec

Through the years it went under several names

— Dunn House, Dunn's Inn, Dunn's Stopping
Place.

It was built between 1820 - 1845, by Josiah Chamberlain who had come from Lowell, Mass., with his three brothers to set up Philemon Wright's mills in Hull. To be near the new mill site it would seem that Josiah constructed the house in the photo. If one looks through a magnifying glass it can be seen that Josiah's original home has been extended under one roof.

The building was acquired by Johnny Dunn, a "river driver" on the Gatineau River, some time in the last quarter of the 19th century, receiving one of the names of previous mention. It burned to the ground in 1900 and was replaced by a "carbon copy" of the original within a year.

The photo dates from about 1890 but unfortunately no person on the two verandahs can be identified.

An interesting part of the story is that Josiah's brother, John, who stayed in the area was an ancestor of Jean Piggot, Chairman of the N.C.C.
