From the Executive Meeting held on November 5:

The Historical Society offers a number of interesting publications that would make ideal Christmas gifts for family and friends:


Courtney Bond's *Hurling Down the Pine*, the story of early logging days in the Gatineau (\$11.95).

Wakefield Covered Bridge Committee

On October 24 the Wakefield Covered Bridge Committee, now a committee of the Historical Society of the Gatineau. held a public meeting to present its plans for rebuilding an exact replica of the 1915 Gendron Bridge. That bridge was destroyed by arson on July 10, 1984. Plans call for the new bridge to be officially opened on Thanksgiving Day, 1992, for pedestrians and cyclists.

At the meeting, Bob Phillips spoke eloquently and passionately about the importance of the bridge as an evocative symbol that touches people and that will make Wakefield a special village in the National Capital Region.

The cost of rebuilding the bridge is estimated at \$600,000; this includes gifts-in-kind such as volunteer labour and donated construction materials. The Committee's action plan calls for 20% of the funds to be raised from corporations, businesses, and community groups and institutions. Another 10% is to come from families and individuals, and 20% from special events. This will all be matched (50%) by government grants. The main feature of the fund-raising strategy will be the "buy a beam, buy a board" campaign, which will be

launched in the spring.

The Committee appealed to community members and associations to become actively involved in the project through contributing ideas, time, and talents, goods, and services - and/or buying a board or a beam. Financial contributions are tax deductible. Is there some way you can "help make it happen"?

Update: the Digester Tower

HSG members will recall the involvement of the Society (and this *Newsletter*) in the campaign a year ago to ensure the preservation of the Digester Tower on the site of the Canadian Museum of Civilization. What is the current status of this building?

George McDonald, Director of the Museum, has informed me that the Tower has been "stabilized", that is, is now not in danger. While the Museum does not have funds to develop the structure in any way in the foreseeable future, discussions are under way on a number of possibilities. However, we can be sure that the Digester Tower is safe - and will remain so.
