


Thanks also should go out to the local merchants who supported the event, and to St. Stephen's Church for the use of their grounds.

Covered Bridge Project Update

Work has been in igh gear at the building site in Wakefield since early May. Over 55,000 board feet of boom logs have been sawn and all four trusses have been completed.

As this Newsletter was "going to press," the bridge volunteers were about to take an important step. During September 4 and 5, they were planning to move the two spans - dimensions 144' x 18.5' x 16' - out of the yard and down to the river bank. There they are to be slid out onto scaffolding on three large barges. Taking one span at a time, and with Hydro Québec slowing the flow of the river, the general contractor (W.D. Laflamme Ltée) planned to push the barges up to the bridge site. A large crane would then lift the span



into place on the shore and centre support. The second span was to follow the same route the following day. Whew!!!

During September, the workers hope to finish the flooring, roofing, siding, and painting.

In terms of financial support, 1996 to date has seen cash donations exceeding \$25,000. However, the committee estimates that a final \$100,000 is required to complete the project.

Government funding has helped. Grants have provided the services of two summer students. The National Capital Commission has offered to contribute \$50,000, provided the project completes its overall funding needs.

The project still needs help, in the form of cash, materials, equipment, and volunteers.


Bridge project faces shortfall of \$100,000

Dimensions: Total length of 86 metres, over two spans, width of 5.5 metres, and weight of 60 tonnes.

Dates: Largest sections, the four pieces that form the two walls, should be put in place Sept. 4 or 5. Construction should be complete in October.

Look: Bridge will be painted red, with a tin roof, with the same lookout slats along its length. Built of Douglas firend hemlock.

History: The first bridge was built in 1915, rebuilt in 1981 and destroyed in July 1984. Fire was arson; no



charges ever laid. Named after a longtime member of the Quebec legislature, Ferdinand-Ambroise Gendron.

Character: One of about 15 covered bridges in West Quebec. Bridges were covered not for esthetic reasons but because the roof protected the deck, greatly extending the life of the bridge; also provided shade and made crossing water easier for skittish horses.

Family History Course October - November 1996

The Ottawa Family History Centre (FHC), the Ottawa Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society (OBOGS), and the British Isles Family History Society of Greater Ottawa (BIFHSGO) is planning a further introductory course in "Tracing Your Family History." It will take place on five Saturdays commencing 19 October and finishing 23 November (with the exception of 9 November) at the Family History Centre, 1017 Prince of Wales Drive, Ottawa.

The training sessions will take 3 hours on each Saturday; they will be supplemented by tours of local sources of information on other days, including necessary registration at such places. Participants will receive a binder containing all hand-outs.

The cost for the complete course will be \$35 or \$30 for members of the sponsoring organizations listed above. The fee is to be paid with the application. However, arrangements can be made for post-dated cheques. Cheques should be made payable to the BIFHSGO, which is acting as course Treasurer.
