# Society Participates in Heritage Fair, May 23 & 24

"Grandmother's Kitchen" will come alive again during the CRB Foundation Heritage Fair, at the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Hull on May 23 and 24. The Society will be joining five other associations from West Quebec in a unique celebration of our heritage.

The Society's main exhibit at the two day fair will be a static presentation of the popular exhibit created by Stuart and Norma Geggie that was once the centrepiece of the Maclaren House Museum. A display of the Society's publications will compliment the exhibit.

The Outaouais Heritage Fair is an educational initiative of the CRB Foundation, designed to increase interest in Canadian history and heritage within a dynamic learning environment. Heritage Fairs are exhibitions of projects made by students about the history and heritage in which they are most interested-i.e. their family, local, or regional history--or, in fact, any Canadian heritage subject that intrigues them. In addition to student participation, the program encourages the general public to get involved, thereby creating links between young people and their community.

Established on a national scale in 1995 by the CRB Foundation, Regional Heritage Fairs will take place this year in more than twenty communities in the ten provinces.

Members of the Society are urged to attend in the First Nations Hall, Ground Floor, Canadian Museum of Civilization, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

# Changes to Society Constitution Being Considered

The Executive of the Historical Society is considering proposing revisions to the Society's constitution. There are two particular alterations being looked at that could profit from some advice from the membership at this time. They are:

## **Society Name**

The traditional name, "Historical Society of the Gatineau," frequently becomes shortened to the "Gatineau Historical Society." This error creates misunderstanding, in that it could be misinterpreted to be the historical society of the City of Gatineau. To clarify matters, the Executive is considering proposing a change in name to:

Historical Society of the Gatineau Valley

OR

Gatineau Valley Historical Society.

### **Term of Office**

The current term of office of members of the Executive Committee (president, two vice presidents, and five directors-at-large) is one year. Under consideration is a change to make the term two years, with half the committee being elected each year, to provide greater continuity and stability to the society.

The program will trace the history of the bridge from 1915 to the present reconstruction and highlight its role as a community focal point and tourist attraction. **THE BRIDGE** is destined for television broadcast and will also be sold locally by the Wakefield Bridge Committee as a way for them to raise funds.

THE BRIDGE will be directed and co-written by local artist Vivian Hanwell, best known for her work on Surviving the Fear, Remembrance Day, and Angels of Mercy, which we re produced by Sound Venture in Ottawa.

She is in the research stage now and looking for people in our community who have photographs, paintings, film, videotape, or interesting stories to tell about the bridge over its long history. "This is a great time for members of the community to check their scrapbooks, attics, and closets for interesting images or artifacts for possible inclusion in the program, " she says.

### Note 1: Loans Receivable

Loans receivable consists of:

- Interest free loan of \$6,000.00 to the Wakefield Bridge Committee. To be repaid: November 1, 1998.
- Interest free loan of \$1,200.00 to G. Lambton for the publication: "The wildest rivers-the oldest hills". To be repaid by September 1, 1998.

### Note 2: Prior Period Adjustment

Interest income in the amount of \$139.00 was earned in 1995. Information related to this interest income was received after the 1995 statements were finalized. In 1996 this is recorded in the Retained Earnings Statement as a Prior Period Adjustment.

The \$139.00 of interest income was reinvested and has been included in the the investment portfolio on the balance sheet
